Ventura Is in. Peculiar

Ventura Is in Peculiar Situation With Reference to Taking Care of Her Dead—Brief News.

VENTURA, March L.—This city is in a strange predleament. It was announced Mondây night at the meeting of the Board of City Trustees that enly one more plot is available in the city cemetery here, and that the place would have to be condemned as a place of burial.

It is owned by the city and was established in the early seventies, and when it is condemned the plot must revert to the original owners of the land, according to the City Attorney. Moreover there is no room within the city boundaries for another cemetery and it will be necessary for private enterprise to take up the task of establishing a new cemetery. A movement is on foot to establish a public mausoleum in the city, but whether it will meet with favor is not certain, and even if it is decided upon it will take some time to establish it. Also it will require time to establish a new cemetery, as no movement whatever has been made in that direction, and Venturans are wondering what they will do if the need of a burial place comes before a plat is found in which to bury their dead.
